
But the real story behind the event was the sacrifice made by a man whose main purpose was to help children while staring down his own mortality.

Retired Air Force Chief Master Sgt. Larry Johns ran a nonprofit organization called Kids Day of Fishing that gives special-needs children the opportunity to try their hands at fishing. It was during a dinner for children with special needs that Brian Floyd, 60th Services Squadron deputy director, met Chief Johns. When Chief Johns was told about this year's event, he expressed his interest in helping with the derby.

"When I told him that we would be interested in working with his organization, he immediately volunteered to supply all of the fish, a large group of volunteers and made a promise that the first 250 children that signed up would receive a brand new fishing pole," said Mr. Floyd.

A week before the derby, a truck with two large tanks carrying bass and catfish backed up to the Duck Pond and sent more than 1,200 pounds of fish hurling into the water. As this year's participants hauled their catch out of the water, few realized the great lengths Chief Johns went to make the day special.

"In the months following our initial introduction, my staff and I times a month," Mr. Floyd said.
